
WAKANDA COLD WEATHER EXPECTATIONS






YEARBOOK

KINDERGARTEN

The month of October has been very busy for Kindergarten. We began our Tuesday stations with the help of parent volunteers. For Reading Workshop we are using our tools/strategies we learned from "We are Readers" and continue to do some fun reading, acting out stories and enjoying some October themed reading activities.

For the Writing Workshop we wrapped up our Illustration unit and then launched the Writer's Workshop where we are putting ideas on paper with pictures and labels.

In Module one Math we continue to write and count numbers to 10.

In Science we will wrap up our Tree unit by taking a field trip to the Environmental Site on Wednesday, October 26th. In Social Studies while working in small groups we made a class book, "What it means to be a Good Citizen." Since October is Fire Safety Month we also have plans to have the fire Department try to make a visit to our school. We will end the month of October with a Kindergarten Halloween Party in the cafeteria on Friday, October 28th with the help of many parent volunteers!

FIRST GRADE

First graders have been busy learning how to add fluently within 10 and are beginning to solve subtraction problems. In Social Studies they learned how to be a good citizen, why we have laws and rules, and even partook in a voting activity. The first grade scientists have been busy studying objects in the sky and the weather. They are also learning more snap words and strategies for solving hard words, building their reading stamina, and are finishing up writing small moment stories. First graders are settling nicely into their classroom routines, have enjoyed several pumpkin activities, and are looking forward to more fun in the weeks to come.

SECOND GRADE

Happy Fall from second grade!

The second graders have almost completed their 2nd month of school and they are making nice progress. In literacy we are building our phonics skills by working on blends and digraphs,

as well as noticing words that are rule breakers that do not follow phonics rules. We have been working on strategies of what to do when we don't know how to read words and if we don't know what the words mean as well as continuing to work on building our reading stamina each day.

In writing we are enjoying writing books about ourselves and the small moments we have had. We are excited to share them with each other!

Our math focus in this module is understanding numbers by building them and breaking them apart. We have really focused on understanding hundreds, tens, and ones. We also continue to work on our fact fluency every day.

In science we are completing our study of rocks and erosion by learning about water and its three states, as well as building materials that are made out of rocks. We have also started Jr. Achievement, a program that pairs someone from the community with our classroom, to teach 5 lessons about our community.

THIRD GRADE

We enjoyed visiting with everyone at conferences! The students are having a great start to 3rd grade! In social studies, they have been learning about urban, suburban and rural communities and about the different regions of the United States. In science, students will be exploring weather and climate and how that impacts how people live in these regions. They have completed their first module in math. Students will come back to multiplication after completing a short module on telling time, measuring and rounding. Students made autumn colored leaves. We are planning to deliver these to a care center for residents to enjoy. As a reminder, students are welcome to bring their Halloween costumes to school on Friday, October 28th. Keep reading at home and happy fall!

FOURTH GRADE

Fourth grade is beginning one of its core math modules: multiplication and division. Students will learn how to multiply with double digits as well as the long division algorithm. We strongly encourage the boys and girls to practice and learn their facts as it will help them immensely as we move through this unit.

We are beginning the second unit of the Benchmark Advance literacy curriculum. Students will learn about characters' actions and reactions while reading fiction. The writing focus has our 4th graders creating opinion essays.

We are completing our study of changes in the earth's landscape over time and will begin studying the northeast region of the United States. While learning about the geography of this part of our county, fourth graders will also study the time period in history that includes the French and Indian War.

FIFTH GRADE

Our High-Achieving 5th Grade Elementary Seniors recently wrapped up several units of study and will now set their sights on the "L.A.U.N.C.H." of the annual National Park Ranger Project. The first phase of our Design Thinking Framework, *Look, Listen and Learn* begins next week. Students will spend the week finding the park that was meant for them to claim as the focus of the project. We will use our Text-dependent Analysis Tool, The R.A.C.E.R. paragraph format to discuss and debate our park selections. This is a great way to receive immediate assessment feedback and practice our PVLEGS/public speaking skills at the same time! We will *Ask Lots of*
